



## Huron Street Apartments Denver, Colorado

This 5-story, 296 luxury apartment community contributes to the urban fabric of Prospect Park, one of Denver's most sought after neighborhoods. Situated in a commercial area, the architecture pays homage to the rich history of the neighborhood with an industrial, modern style. The architect's vision called for large combination units to mimic the light and feel created by the storefront spaces on the lower levels.

Vinylmax Trends single-hung and fixed units were selected for their structural integrity, ease of combination, and clean, attractive lines. A brushed silver exterior laminate maintains the industrial feel of the surrounding neighborhood. Coordinating laminated sliding glass doors with transoms access balcony features in certain residential units.









Outdoor courtyards on two evels with plantings inspired by the landscape of the nearby Rocky Mountain foothills give residents easy access to nature in the city. A lounge with tech bar, billiards room, bark park, fitness room, and pool are just a few of the amenities available.

## UNIQUE REQUIREMENTS/SOLUTIONS

- A brushed silver exterior laminate was selected to maintain the industrial feel of the surrounding neighborhood. Custom 1.2" simulated divided lites were laminated to match.
- Complimentary laminated sliding glass doors with transoms are used to access balcony features in certain residential units.
- ClimaGuard Low E glazing with argon fill was included to meet high thermal standards and to address the UV penetration challenges at Denver's high altitude.

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
